Shelters/rescues: Share these ideas with new adopters/fosters BEFORE the dog leaves your facility

## Dogs at High Risk of Becoming Lost

- Newly adopted dogs
- Foster dogs
- Rescue dogs during transport
- Dogs in an unfamiliar place
- Dogs that have recently moved to a new home
- Shy, fearful, or unsocialized dogs

## THE TRIP HOME

- Properly fitted collar with ID tag with your name, phone numbers, and address.
- Microchipped and registered to YOU.
- No stops or potty breaks!
- Dog securely confined in crate or
- harnessed securely to seat belt with a restraint.
- **Two leashes:** One to collar and second to harness.
- NO RETRACTABLE LEASH!
- Firm grip on leash! Try closing one leash in car door so the handle is outside, allowing you to grab leash handle before opening car door.

## THE FIRST MONTH

- Check the fence. Can he get under, over, or through it?
- Lock gate with a padlock.
- Don't leave him in the yard unattended.
   Until you know what to expect from each other, no outings or trips away from home.
- Double-leash him if leaving the yard using a martingale collar and harness.
- NO RETRACTABLE LEASH EVER! If you drop the leash it'll drag noisily behind him. He'll panic and run to escape. What's chasing me?!

## IF YOUR DOG GETS LOST

- **Do not call or chase!** Sit down. Don't make eye contact. Talk quietly, and gently toss tasty/smelly treats.
- Immediately call the shelter, rescue, foster home, breeder or former owner to enlist their help. Don't delay out of embarrassment or fear of repercussions. Do what's best for your dog!
- **Fill out a lost dog form** through our partner: PetFBI.org. This free service allows you to download flyers, and enters him into a map-based, searchable database. Our volunteers will be notified so we can help.
- Switch gears from "catching" to "luring.
